

Editorial

Seek and you can find

Although we no longer need ink and paper to communicate, it's fun to realise that at some point in history ink was made from the outcome of a tiny parasitic wasp, its larvae and an acorn. The egg or larva secretes a mixture of starches, enzymes, and compounds that trigger a chemical reaction, activating a trauma response in the tree. This leads to the formation of a gall, a cocoon that protects and feeds the wasp larva as it grows. While not fully understood, this process is common, with over 1,300 gall wasp species worldwide!

I was shown what to look for - a large popcorn-like growth on the side of an acorn - so I spent a few weeks scanning the ground on dog walks but had absolutely no luck. Then, one day, I was out near the polo field with my daughter, and she spied something strange on the ground - it was exactly what I'd been searching for - a knopper oak

gall. Once found, we could then 'see' all the others that were nearby, and since then, have known what to look for (as not every tree produces them). I've learned that there are many other types of gall too, round ones with little holes in and galls in different trees and made by different insects, but the oak knopper ones seem the easiest to find.

To make the ink, you will need about 20 of these galls, which need to be crushed, soaked, simmered, and reduced to extract the tannins. Then a rusty nail dropped in to cause a chemical reaction. It's this process that turns the tannins black! Finally it is strained and gum arabic is added to create the right consistency for writing and to bind the ink to the paper to make it last longer.

Many historical figures have used oak gall ink to craft their works, dating back to Pliny the Elder in the 1st century. Over time, this ink was

favoured by notable individuals like engineer and artist Leonardo da Vinci. It also played a part in shaping historic documents such as the Magna Carta and the US Declaration of Independence. Renowned composers like Bach and Mozart also relied on it, and even physicist Isaac Newton had his unique recipe, which included beer!

So next time you're out for a walk, keep an eye out for them and marvel at how they have played

a part in our history.

Iced Christmas Pudding with Glacé Fruits

From Delia Smith's Christmas recipe book: a frozen alternative to Christmas pudding. Serves 8.

FOR THE RUM-SOAKED FRUIT:

60 g candied peel (orange, lemon and citron), cut into small chunks

25 g raisins

3 glacé cherries, cut into quarters

6 tablespoons dark rum

FOR THE ICE CREAM

4 egg yolks

110 g caster sugar

425 ml thick double cream

200 ml Greek yoghurt

40 g creamed coconut, grated

You will need a 1.5 litre pudding basin.

Marinate all the fruits in the rum overnight. Next day, in a bowl, whisk the egg yolks and sugar together. Then in a small saucepan bring the cream up to simmering point and add the grated coconut to it, stirring until the coconut has dissolved completely. Now pour the cream and coconut mixture on to the egg mixture, whisking all the time - it should thicken like light egg custard. Allow it to cool slightly before adding the yoghurt. Stir everything well and leave to get cold before adding the marinated fruits together with the rum.

Stir well again, then pour the whole mixture into the pudding basin, cover with cling film and place in the freezer until almost set - this is when the ice cream has the consistency of 'soft scoop', and it can take up to 7 hours to set to this stage. At this point stir it very thoroughly to distribute any ice crystals and make sure the fruits are evenly distributed. Return to the freezer overnight.

The ice cream will freeze, but still remain soft in texture. To turn it out dip the bowl briefly in hot water, then slide a palette knife around the edge. Serve at once, cut into slices.

NOTE: Because this ice cream is soft in texture there is no need to remove it from the freezer in advance of serving. Any ice cream pudding left over after serving must be returned immediately to the freezer and taken out again for second helpings.

Christians around the world have used the four weeks before Christmas to prepare their hearts for the celebration of Jesus' birth. 




